Healing & Deliverance – Pray for divine healing for those suffering from sickness, addictions, depression, and other struggles, that they may encounter the power of Jesus.


Government & Leaders – Pray for the government officials and local authorities to govern with wisdom, justice, and openness to the Gospel.




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From the THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

Fierce love? Are you sure?

Most times, we don't put those two words together. We think of "fierce" as aggressive, destructive and fearful, and love as soft, tender and peaceful. But "fierce" has another side to it—heartfelt and passionate intensity. This definitely describes the character of Jesus' love.

The fierce love of Jesus lies beyond our comprehension and normal practice. We get a tiny glimpse of this fierce love in the foot-washing episode of John 13.

Think about the context of this event..

In a few hours, Jesus will face a mock trial by wicked men who are supposed to be the moral and religious examples of the people but hate the truth Jesus consistently lives and speaks about God. He will be flayed without mercy by sadistic Roman soldiers. He will face a great mob who cry for His death though He has likely healed many of them or members of their families. He will die by crucifixion, a death so cruel and obscene that no respectable person dared to mention it.

All of this loomed over Him. He knew exactly what was coming His way that very night. He would die the worst of deaths and bear the sin of humanity on top of everything. He would experience a period of separation from His Father from whom He had never been separated for even a second of eternity. None of us can fully comprehend it all, and we stagger under its weight when we try.

Our tame pictures of the crucifixion convey only the tiniest fraction of what Jesus endured and suffered. Smooth and varnished church crosses numb us to the demonic ugliness, hate and evil He actually would face on that cross.

Yet just a few hours before His death, He thinks of His disciples and their comfort in one of the most humbling details—their tired and dirty and smelly feet. He, their Master of masters, even takes the role of a lowly servant and washes each disciple's feet.

He does not leave out Judas Iscariot who will soon betray Him with a kiss and submit Him to His agony. Nor does He leave out Peter who will deny Him with curses. The others are no better--they will all abandon him to the merciless rage of His executioners.

He knows all of this will take place that very night, yet He performs this humble and menial servant task anyway. There is something else we should keep in mind about the context of this incident...

All the gospels repeatedly portray Jesus' disciples as dull learners who, over the past three years, forget what He says and does almost as soon as they hear and see it. If we had met the disciples during this time, we would not have been impressed with them. We would have seen no hint of greatness in any of them. Instead, we would have seen them fight and bicker over the most inane and childish things, and we would have puzzled over why Jesus associated with such a miserable bunch.

Yet He says to these twelve pitiful and childish men, "Unto you it is given to know the mystery of the kingdom of God." His love for them never wavers for a second, even in spite of their habitual stupidity and soon-to-be-revealed cowardice.

The love of Jesus is stronger than death. It is a fierce love that stops at nothing, is discouraged by nothing, not by even the worst and most petty parts of human nature. His love accepts the full reality of sin but completely overrules and overcomes it by even greater good. It crushes every lesser thing in its path.

Charles Spurgeon once said: "Earthworms are miserable company for angels...yet love made our great Master endure the society of His ignorant and carnal followers." His great love is conditioned by nothing. That's what Jesus demonstrated that night as He washed His disciples' feet.

In contrast, our own weak and sentimental love is conditioned by a thousand different things. We are always getting offended by something or someone. We allow the most trivial things to divide us for months, years, and even a lifetime or many lifetimes. Political correctness is a symptom of how unloving we have become as a society and within the church itself.

Many of today's young people leave the church when they reach adulthood. The church remains unattractive to them because they are not impressed by the unloving characters of most church people, including their own parents. They are aware of their sins and feel deep guilt over them. They fear coming to church to hear more rebuke than encouragement. They hunger for redemption and release, but they hear only judgment and bickering over lesser issues.

Before we become completely discouraged with ourselves, let us remember the good news: the fierce love of Jesus always wins in the end! His fierce love includes you and me! The disciples (except for Judas Iscariot) did not remain dullards and cowards. As imperfect and unheroic as they were during those dark days, they still had tiny mustard seeds of faith that enabled them to humble themselves before Him after their abject failure. That fact allowed Jesus' fierce love to fill them with the Holy Spirit and turn them into bold and eloquent witnesses and workers of signs and wonders that began winning thousands of men, women and children to Christ.

They moved mountains, laying foundations that would eventually change people and societies far beyond Jerusalem and Galilee. The foundations they laid have continued to our present day. For the fierce love of Jesus, these former cowards eventually sacrificed their own lives.

The fierce love of Jesus has not changed over the past 2,000 years. The fierce love of Jesus covers you and me just as it covered His disciples. Today, He is washing our feet even as He washed the disciples' feet. What He did to transform His original weak disciples into bold witnesses He is still able to accomplish through you and me as we trust Him with our own mustard seeds of faith. Then we, too, will move mountains.

Let us as Jesus' 21st century disciples remember, trust and experience again and again the fierce love of Jesus that stops at nothing and will not let us go. This is the greatest weapon by which we fight the works of the devil. This is how we defeat fear, doubt and hopelessness. This is how we stop medicating ourselves with materialism and worldliness. The fierce love of Christ restores relationship with God's everlasting love and ends mere religion and legalism.

When the fierce love of Jesus possesses our hearts and minds, we have the one thing for which the rest of the world truly hungers. May that day come sooner rather than later!



His earthly ministry extremely witnessed immense love in the form of healing, compassion, deliverance, instruction, provision, etc., the finest exemplary demonstration of His love on the cross of Calvary. God loves sinners. Christian anthropology must be centralised with loving sinners (Mark 2:15-22), neighbours (Mark 12:30-31) and enemies (Matthew 5:144). Jesus' life replicates the best way of reflecting love to others. Education (theological or Christian) is meaningful when Christ's

love is practised in a learner (disciple, scholar, and believer) rather than just being engaged in sharing the word of God for the sake of ministry. Missionaries throughout the centuries have practiced it in different contexts. The pure religion practices the love towards the poor, destitute, widows, and others (James 1:27).

Those are rejected from home, workplace, society, etc. Christians must encourage them to be found in Christ's love. If such people are brought into the fold of Christ, they can experience the love of God in life. People need the love, the true love, which provides consolation and peace in them. We are the agents of demonstrating Christ's love to others. Whether you are a graduate or a Christian believer, I would like to let you know that we are to stand for true love that is found in Christ. Our speech, attitude, and actions must show the love of Christ. People should know that Christians are loving and caring people. People may entitle us as per our way of appearance and work.

People need to recognise us as followers of Christ and reflect his attitude to others. Otherwise, we are not real Christians, and Christ's love is not in us. "Reflection" can be defined with two ways

- 1. Character Reflection Demonstrating Christ's love and values through our actions, words, and attitudes.
- Personal Reflection Taking time to evaluate and learn from our actions, decisions, and experiences.

Radiation refers to spreading energy, light, or influence. When we say someone "radiates Christ's love," it means they express that love in a way that positively impacts others. Our theme calls us to represent and express Christ's love in all we do, reflecting it in our actions and radiating it to those around us.

The theme calls every disciple of Christ to not only reflect but also radiate His love in a powerful way, fulfilling the Great Commission. To achieve this, disciples must live in a manner that allows the light of Christ to shine through them, influencing and impacting those around them. Aligned with this theme, this article highlights 5 daily habits that will help you live as the light and reflect Christ's love in your everyday actions.

- 1. Authenticity In a world focused on appearances, authenticity reflects Christ's love through steadfastness and integrity. It means staying true to your beliefs and values across all settings, exemplifying Christ's consistency and compassion. A biblical example is Daniel, who remained faithful in Babylon despite immense pressure. He refused to defile himself, worship false idols, or abandon prayer, living out his commitment to God regardless of the consequences. His integrity influenced even King Darius, who acknowledged God's greatness (Daniel 6:26-27). Authenticity isn't about over-sharing but aligning your actions and words with your beliefs, even when challenging. By living authentically, we reflect Christ's truth and love, inspiring others to draw closer to Him.
- 2. Humility Humility is recognizing our limitations, learning from others, and admitting when we're wrong. It involves prioritizing others without diminishing ourselves. True humility is strength under control, not weakness. Moses exemplified humility by acknowledging his limitations and seeking God's guidance throughout his leadership (Exodus 3:11, Exodus 4:10). Despite being chosen by God, he remained humble and relied on God's strength (Numbers 12:3). Jesus, though divine, humbled Himself by serving others and sacrificing His life (Philippians 2:6-8). To reflect Christ's love, humility must be central to our lives. By practicing humility daily, we radiate His love, fostering deeper relationships and mutual respect.
- **3. Forgiveness** Forgiveness is essential for reflecting Christ's love, benefiting both our spiritual and physical well-being. Research shows that forgiving can lower blood pressure, boost

immune function, and reduce heart disease risk. Joseph exemplified forgiveness when he chose to forgive his brothers, despite their betrayal, saying, "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good" (Genesis 50:20). Jesus, even on the cross, prayed for those who crucified Him, setting the ultimate example of forgiveness (Luke 23:34). Forgiveness isn't about forgetting but releasing others from their debt, as Christ did for us. It's challenging but transformative, bringing healing, peace, and stronger relationships. Let's make forgiveness a daily practice to reflect Christ's love.

- 4. **Generosity**-Generosity is giving selflessly without expecting anything in return. It extends beyond money to include time, talents, and resources for the benefit of others. Christ demonstrated generosity through acts like feeding thousands with a small offering (John 6:1-14) and ultimately giving His life for our salvation (John 3:16). The widow of Zarephath also exemplified generosity, offering her last food to the prophet Elijah during a famine, trusting God would provide (1 Kings 17:7-16). Her faith and selflessness were rewarded by God's provision. In a world that often values personal gain, practicing generosity sets us apart. Small acts of kindness, like lending a hand or offering a word of encouragement, can make a big impact. Generosity reflects Christ's love and brings joy, as Jesus taught, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).
- 5. Compassion Compassion is empathising with others' suffering and taking action to ease it. It goes beyond pity; it's stepping into someone's

pain and offering help. Christ's ministry was filled with compassion, from healing the sick (Matthew 14:14) to comforting the grieving (John 11:33-35). The story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) highlights compassion, as the Samaritan went beyond societal boundaries to care for a wounded man. In our busy lives, we must cultivate compassion, whether by listening, providing a meal, or offering presence. Every act of compassion reflects Christ's love and brings light into the world. Let's make compassion a daily habit.

Living out Christ's love is a daily commitment to represent His teachings through our actions, words, and attitudes. The habits of authenticity, humility, forgiveness, generosity, and compassion help us radiate His transformative love, drawing others to Him. Introduction

Scholarship the pursuit of knowledge and understanding has always been a cornerstone of human advancement. For Christians, however, this endeavour transcends intellectual exploration, taking a deeply spiritual dimension rooted in the love of Christ. The transformative power of Christ's love provides a framework for the scholarship that transcends personal ambition and aligns academic endeavours with God's divine purpose. This article examines how Christ's love illuminates scholarship, highlighting biblical principles and practical applications for academic life.

2. Biblical Examples of Illuminated Scholarship

The Bible provides numerous examples of individuals who exemplified Christ's love and wisdom in their intellectual pursuits. Daniel and his companions stand out as models of faith-integrated scholarship. In Daniel 1:17, it is noted that "God gave them learning and skill in all literature and wisdom, and Daniel had understanding in all visions and dreams." Despite being in a foreign and hostile environment, they used their God give knowledge to serve both God and their community, demonstrating humility, integrity, and reliance on divine wisdom.

The Apostle Paul is another example. His writings reveal a profound integration of theological insight and practical application. In 1 Corinthians 2:13, Paul describes his teaching as "not in words taught by human wisdom but in those taught by the Spirit, interpreting spiritual truths to those who are

spiritual." Paul's scholarship was deeply rooted in his relationship with Christ, enabling him to address complex issues with clarity and grace.

3. Practical Implications for Modern Scholarship

Illuminating scholarship with Christ's love has profound implications for contemporary academics.


First, it calls for an ethic of love in interactions with colleagues, students, and the broader community. 



If you are arrogant and hard to handle in the church, community, society and institutions or Bible colleges? Do you think God is going to be soft on you? Does the court show a soft corner to the criminal? I don't think so, know that He is also just, holy and righteous, he demands the same result or price. His justice does not allow the criminal to go free but to punish and give him equal punishment. Remember that "iron is sharpened by iron" (Proverbs 27:17) not by sponge. In order to make you gold or refine you, you must go through with fire. When God humbles us it is not going to be easy, He will not be as soft, as kind, as gracious or as you assume, the Bible says in Hebrews 10:31, "It is a terrifying thing to fall into the hands of the living God."

Jesus instructed his disciples and future adherents to love one another as he loved them (John 13:34). Hence, we must examine closely how Christ manifested his love for his disciples. This necessitates meticulous observation from the moment of his selection of a student until his departure from the earth, illustrating Christ's authentic love for his students. The Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John indicate that from the moment he selected his disciples, he exhibited love and compassion for them, fostering their transformation in thought, speech, and behavior within society.

Jesus' choice of disciples was not influenced by social status. In the context of the first century, Rabbis would not accept a fisherman or a tax collector as their pupil. They anticipate pupils to excel academically and also commit the Torah to memory. They must exhibit exceptional discipline in academics. Moreover, in Roman culture, children from affluent households were afforded numerous educational opportunities. The curriculum emphasized rhetoric, philosophy, and governance, and was formal in nature. This strategy established a hierarchical relationship between student and teacher. At this point, Christ predominantly selected fishermen and a tax collector, who were considered lower-class individuals in the Mediterranean world. This indicates that God's

divine understanding is not confined to philosophers, rabbis, or the highly educated. This established a sphere of learning within Jesus' school founded on love rather than hierarchy because in the first century, the connection between teachers and students was predominantly formal, resulting in a significant gap between them.

Jesus instructed his followers both formally and informally to prepare them as future educators. He instructed them with parables, narratives, and pragmatic lessons to facilitate their comprehension of the kingdom of God. At numerous instances, the disciples failed to comprehend Jesus' teachings; yet, in private, they could approach Him without fear and enquire freely. Jesus would answer to them with patience and politeness to facilitate their understanding. He established a network of relationships rather than acquiring plain knowledge. He was acquainted with his disciples and diligently instructed them. He consistently taught the kingdom of God through parables and narratives, and he did not dismiss them. Jesus guided people via his outstanding existence. He exemplified the essence of life as a humble and dignified individual, demonstrating love and compassion via his care for the needy and impoverished people, and encouraging them to practice forgiveness, especially towards their

adversaries. This illustrates Jesus' desire to reform them and establish a new community before his departure from Earth.

Jesus stated, "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends." (John 15:13). This phrase was ultimately realized when Christ sacrificed his life for his disciples and for humanity. The same author employs this principle in 1 John 3:16, stating, "This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters." The principle is affectionate brotherhood necessitates sacrifices when necessary.

Ultimately, Jesus did not abandon them; he assured them of his perpetual presence. He informed them that he would not abandon them as orphans but would send the Holy Spirit to remain with them eternally (Matthew 28:18-20; John 14:16-17). Although Christ is not here today, his teachings remain with us. His words are pertinent to us now. Irrespective of our backgrounds, we must love one another. Regrettably, numerous churches today are fragmented due to caste distinctions, resulting in divisions within caste-based churches and congregations. In the school of Christ, everyone who wishes to be disciples is considered brothers and sisters, with no discrimination based on caste or creed.




Heart:




